f the 400+ burnout rides down an eighth mile of Main Street London, Ohio during the London Cobra Show, to raise money for the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, we think the lion's share were handled by a grinning Bob Bondurant, one of the honored guests at this year's event. Bob took a real shine, again this year, to John Spina's quiet but ultra fast Everett-Morrison replica powered by a Grand National turbocharged V-6.

Bondurant was also asked by famed Cobra racer Dick Smith's widow, Heather, to pilot the venerable ol #198 down the lane a few times to the cheers of the crowd. One would think that a guy would take it easy the first couple of passes in an unfamiliar car, but apparently Bob only has one speed; full on. Dick's car was on hand as a tribute to the racer and because this year's raffle replica was a faithful clone of his "Fastest Cobra Ever," a Factory Five Mk4 built by volunteers of the Ohio Cobra Club (OCC).
